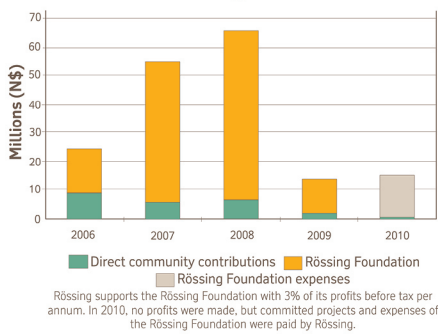

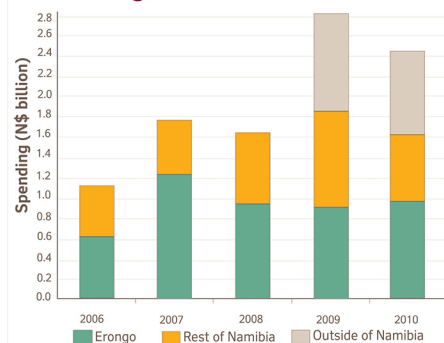
Enhancing our strength

- The Rössing Foundation is our corporate social investment arm; since its inception N\$120 million was invested in CSI programmes.

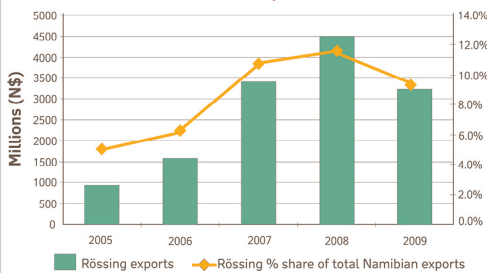
Rössing's contribution to its communities and the Rössing Foundation



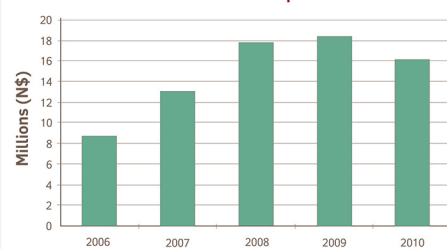
Payments to external suppliers of goods and services



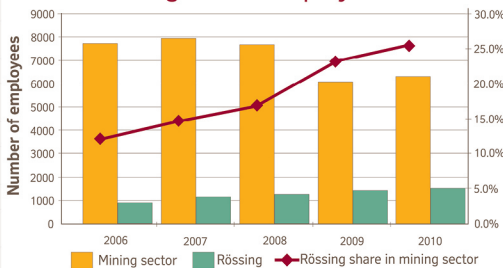
Rössing's contribution to Namibia's export value
